

What do you need?

Shoebox, Printer, Paper, Scissors, Glue/sticky tape, Decorating materials (paints/ crayons/pens/coloured papers)

How to make a shoebox habitat

- 1. To start, prepare the shoebox by removing the lid and turn your box horizontally on one of the long sides.
- 2. Print out the savannah craft pack. If you do not have a printer, why not try to draw your own copy?
- Cut out and glue/sticky tape the background to the back wall of the shoebox. You might also like to decorate the sides of your shoebox using any extra materials you have available (coloured paper, sand, grass, pebbles, etc).
- 4. Next, carefully cut out each item. Care must be taken as this can be quite fiddly adult supervision might be required.
- 5. The tabs found on some of the items can be folded back 90 degrees and glued/ sticky taped to the bottom of the shoebox.
- 6. Have fun and create your savannah environment. Explore other content on our Go wild at home hub to help you create the perfect wildcat habitat.


For your African wildcat, have you thought of...


Where do they sleep? Somewhere to toilet? A hiding place or somewhere up high? Somewhere to drink? Something to eat? Something to scratch?
